It is evidence which would never have been obtained had it not been for the unlawful 19 19 search warrant and, therefore, I exclude any 20 21 evidence from the point of the issuance of the 22 search warrant onwards. 23 There is some evidence left to consider as 24 to what the witnesses saw at the time, leading up to the search warrant. There is obviously some 25 26 holes in the Crown's case in that the Crown was 27 relying on certain things which took place 28 following the search, but I will hear argument 29 with respect to whether or not there should be a 30 conviction on the merits. . 31 With respect to the letter written to the 32 accused, I did not hear Mr. Wool's argument other 33 than the case which he provided.
